Advent's purple is more at the blue end of the spectrum, reminiscent of the night sky just before dawn. Vatican II encouraged churches to use blue to celebrate Advent. Comfort and Healing

In Mark 6:12-13, St. Mark tells the apostles, to "anoint with oil many sick people and heal them. In James 5:14-15, St. James asks, "Is any one among you sick? Then call in the priest and the faith community and have them pray over those who are sick and anoint them with oil in the name of Christ. And this prayer of faith will save the frail and raise them up."

The Oil of the Sick is blessed by the bishop at the cathedral on Holy Thursday morning. It is pure olive oil. The characteristic of olive oil is the healing and strengthening effect it possesses.

When we are apprehensive, God offers us this sacrament to quiet anxiety and dissipate fear. We are blessed with the peace of mind and confidence in God this sacrament bestows.
