FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT. NOVEMBER 27: The liturgical environment reflects the quiet and the dark where we wait in ongoing vigil for the birth of Jesus celebrated at Christmas. Advent's purple is more at the blue end of the spectrum, reminiscent of the night sky just before dawn. Vatican II encouraged churches to use blue to celebrate Advent. The image of light in the night persists throughout the Liturgy of the Word, revealing Jesus, Light come into the world. The wreath suspended over the church center aisle and decorated with greens and lights, offers light in the winter darkness.
