

NATIONAL BLACK CATHOLIC HISTORY MONTH

In 1990 the National Black Clergy Caucus designated November as National Black Catholic History Month. Annually this is an opportunity to highlight the heritage, patrimony and witness of Black Catholics.

The poster in the narthex is Sister Thea Bowman. She was a black catholic sister religious, teacher, and scholar who made a major contribution to the ministry of the Catholic Church toward African Americans. She was born and in Yazoo, Mississippi in 1937 and died in March, 1990 in Canton, Mississippi.

Sister Thea, gifted with a brilliant mind, beautiful voice and a dynamic personality, shared the message of God's love throughout a 16 year teaching career.

The bishop of Jackson, Mississippi, invited her to become the consultant for intercultural awareness. As a consultant Sister Thea gave presentations across the country; lively gatherings that combined singing, gospel preaching, prayer and storytelling. Her programs were designed to foster racial justice and promote cultural unity. The U.S. bishops endorsed the sainthood cause of Sister Thea in 2018. She transcended racism to leave a lasting mark on U.S. Catholic life in the late 20th century.
