

## **BLACK HISTORY MONTH: Black Resistance**

This year's theme explores African Americans resistance of historic and ongoing oppression racial terrorism, racial programs, and police killings since the nation's beginning.


Most Holy Trinity focuses attention on contributions of African Americans. We honor all Black people from all periods of history, from enslaved people brought here from Africa to African Americans living in the United States today

### FREDERICK DOUGLASS (1818 – 1895).

He was born into slavery in Maryland and escaped after his third try. He became one of the most active, and well-known abolitionists. The 14th and 15th amendments describe his activism. Douglass was a writer and a supporter of women's rights. His first book, THE NARRATIVE OF THE LIFE OF FREDERICK DOULASSS, AN AMERICAN SLAVE, was published in 1845. He wrote for abolitionist newspapers and created his own newspaper, THE NORTH STAR. Douglass served in government posts, e.g., U.S. Marshal for the District of Columbia and U. S. Minister Resident and Consul General to the Republic of Haiti.

In the most recent book published in 2020, FREDERICK DOUBLASS; PHOPHET OF FREEDOM, David Blight utilizes papers now available. The book gives a complete and compelling picture of Douglass, his personal life and dedication to the eradication of slavery and the establishment of civil rights for all people.

#### **CELEBRATE OUR NEIGHBORS**

**Bethlehem Lutheran Church** was located at 2153 Salisbury Avenue. Bethlehem Lutheran Church was constructed in 1895. The parish was organized in 1849. The church originally had two spires, but they were destroyed in a 1927 tornado.

The church became a City Landmark in 1976. It was demolished in



2013...a legacy of faith and hope thrive today.
