# THE TWOFOLD CALL

Today we witness the call of Jonah and the call of Jesus' first disciples. Each one of us also is called by God, called by name to announce the Good News of Jesus Christ. Jonah first ran away, literally, from God's call. Jonah is



likely afraid of the people of Nineveh who could ridicule him because of his preaching. He might have also be afraid of an intimate relationship with God; deep love requires great risk. Nonetheless, God pursues Jonah, out of love for Jonah and for the people of Nineveh. God desires that the people of Nineveh be saved and God desires friendship with Jonah. The first call to friendship with God is the most important call; the work of prophecy or a particular purpose is also important, but it is of second importance.

In the Gospels we frequently see the disciples wrestling with Jesus' teaching, with each other and with those who threaten Jesus. Every time, Jesus calls them first to himself, then to the mission. When our hearts are open to God's call to intimate friendship; the building of the Reign of God, our second call, is strengthened by the first.

As St. Josephine Bakhita Parish, we open wide our doors and our hearts to worship, evangelize, and serve all God's people.
