FINDING ISHMAEL

The Transfiguration of Jesus presents the completion of the Law and the Prophets in Jesus, who through his death and resurrection, fulfills all God's promises. In the reading from Genesis Abraham is willing to



sacrifice Isaac. The text from Genesis describes the willingness of Abraham to sacrifice his son, as prefiguring the immensity of Jesus' love to give his life for all. This is a spiritual analogy: love comes at a great cost.

What about Ishmael who is also a son of Abraham? Ismael is also sacrificed, sent out into the desert with his mother, Hagar, to die. God intervenes, when Ishmael is near death, to save him. We are to experience the transformation in holiness promised by the Transfiguration. We seek Ishamel in our lives. Ishmael is the forgotten one, literally forgotten in the Bible itself. It is important for us to journey out into the desert, all the way to the edge of our lives, past the point where fear asks us to stop looking, to bring everything into the light. In Christ, all is remembered, all is holy, all is held tenderly; Christ is with the forsaken and the cast out. Jesus rises from the dead, bringing everyone and everything back to life, including Ishmael.

St. Josephine Bakhita, you are with us.

WE CELEBRATE BLACK HISTORY MONTH

AFRICAN AMERICANS AND ART

"In the fields of visual and performing arts, literature, fashion, folklore, language, film, music, architecture, culinary and other forms of cultural expression, the African American influence has been paramount. African American artists have used art to nurture history, community memory and empowerment. Artistic and cultural movements such as the New Negro, Black Arts, Black Renaissance, hip-hop, and Afrofuturism, have been led by those of African descent and set the standard for trends around the world. In 2024, we examine the history and life of African American arts and artisans."

Katherine Mary Dunham (June 22, 1909 – May 21, 2006) was an American dancer, choreographer, anthropologist, and social activist. Dunham had one of the most successful dance careers of the 20th century and directed her own dance company for many years. She has been called the "matriarch and queen mother of black dance."

While a student at the University of Chicago, Dunham also performed as a dancer, ran a dance school, and earned an early bachelor's degree in anthropology. Receiving a post graduate academic fellowship, she went to the Caribbean to study the African diaspora, ethnography and local dance. She returned to graduate school and submitted a master's thesis to the anthropology faculty, yet did not complete that degree as she realized that her professional calling was performance and choreography.

Dunham was an innovator in African-American modern dance as well as a leader in the field of dance anthropology.
